Our Mission

Mental Health America of Indiana's (MHAI's) mission is to work for Indiana's mental health and victory over mental illness.

Our work has resulted in positive change. MHAI provides programs, education, and training to the professional field and the general public on behavioral health. Our treatment services have expanded equitable access to services for individuals seeking care. MHAI hopes to continue to reduce conditions that impede the attainment of mental wellness and recovery for all Hoosiers. In addition, our organization develops partnerships with stakeholders in Indiana to promote behavioral health advocacy and public policy.





Our Board

Mental Health America of Indiana is overseen by a volunteer Board of Directors composed of mental health and business professionals, people with lived experience, and advocates whom represent our mission. Meeting quarterly, the Board directs the strategic objectives and policy of the organization.

The role of the Board of Directors is to provide subject matter expertise, input, and collaboration to the organization. Focusing on mission, programs, and policy, this provides MHAI with statewide stakeholders that possess specific expertise and influence in the subject matter to the organization.

Our Team

The Mental Health America of Indiana staff philosophy is to combine lived experience with professional integrity. This helps our organization understand how individuals living with mental health conditions can be positively impacted through our work.



Sometimes, as a society, we forget that individuals living with mental health conditions are not really different in so many ways. They have activities that they enjoy, people that they love, and dreams that they want to achieve. We have come a long way, leaving behind the dark stain to our nation's history, as we have de-institutionalized state hospitals and removed the shackles of inadequate mental health treatment among our communities. Today, we look to a new hope, where behavioral health care is properly funded, crisis can be navigated by dialing a three-digit number, and Hoosiers living with mental health conditions no longer fear the stigma created by their peers.




The MHAI policy team worked with stakeholders across the state of Indiana to advance mental health priorities in during the 2023 Indiana Legislative Session.

In 2023, the MHAI policy team's work focused on the passage of two priority bills, HEA 1006 and SEA 1. Because of our communications this session, over 1,500 Hoosiers sent a letter urging their legislator to support the implementation of the new three-digit suicide lifeline number – 988 – for mental health crises. MHAI's public policy and advocacy work continues to be the strongest, largest, and oldest behavioral health network throughout the state.

Public Policy 2023 Highlights:

- SEA 1:
 - Invests in Indiana's community mental health centers
 - Builds the 9-8-8 crisis response hotline
 - Maintains the Be-Well Crisis Helpline
 - Continues of the Indiana Behavioral Health Commission
- HEA 1006:
 - Helps individuals with mental illness get out of jail and into treatment
- Indiana will give \$100 million for mental health services and resources over the next two years
- Indiana will give \$10 million to establish Regional Treatment Centers over the next two years
- Indiana sets to dramatically expand the services and resources offered by local health departments in SEA 4
